Treasurer's report 2019 Audit exemption

- Full audits typically cost at least £3,000
 - Unaudited report costs £700
 - Exemptions permitted if: Turnover less than £5.6.1.
 Total value of assets less than £2.8m



- As reported last year, we took expert advice to:
 - Consider full audit periodically, or if unusually high levels of income/expenditure anticipated
 - Keep under review
- For 2019-20 we recommend exemption and to submit unaudited report prepared by our accountants (D. Cadwallader & Co. Ltd)


- No disabled access

The finished product








Project timeline

- Three years from start to finish
- Funding crisis / delay when quotations received
- Build took 6 months originally anticipated 3 months




The above are elected for a 3-year term.

Good Neighbour scheme



BACBS Good Neighbour Scheme



- Proposal made to last year's annual members meeting for a good neighbour scheme
- To serve Beckley, Elsfield, Stanton St John, Forest Hill and their surrounding rural areas. (Islip, Noke, Woodeaton already have a scheme [3 parishes], as does Horton-cum-Studley).
- Lifts for community social events at the Abingdon Arms or the Village Hall, and subsequently to include Islip surgery
- For those without their own transport who would find such trips difficult to arrange.

- Meetings in February 2019 to gauge support from local villages.
- Cathy Davies and John Stradling asked to lead on the scheme.
- Information sent out to inform and publicise possible future scheme in local newsletters etc.
- Meeting in March with Sally McQuillan (3
 Parishes scheme), Rosie White (Age UK
 and GNS co-ordinator with Volunteer Link
 Up). Generous offer to share information &
 documentation.
- Meetings in April with established similar schemes

- Decision made to start small, and grow as necessary in response to demand
- Meeting with Islip Surgery (Beverley Turner)
- We decided to hone the bureaucracy down to: I)
 Enhanced DBS* checks for the drivers, as this was a requirement from Islip Surgery, and 2) assurances that drivers' normal car insurance covered us.
- Decided to start with about 10 volunteer drivers as part of the 'pilot' and a general instruction/advice sheet prepared for them.
- DBS checks provided free by Age UK/Volunteer Link-Up and started in May.

Community Survey results

Community Survey results - I

General

The Community Survey produced great information. We have given an anonymised version to the new tenants.

Frequency of eating and drinking at the pub

Large proportion visit rarely or only once/twice a month.

Challenge for new tenants to increase "footfall".

Underlines the fact that the pub can't survive on local custom alone.

Style of pub

Majority want a pub with:

- good food and drink
- pub standard fare AND...
- high quality catering
- good choices for veggies and vegans as well

Community Survey results - 2

Apart from beers...

Strong support for:

- a better range of nonalcoholic drinks, but also
- high-quality wines
- gins.

Accessibility

Many suggestions but a regular theme of improving accessible access to the terrace area.

Improvements to pub and garden

Plenty of ideas but most are happy with the pub and garden as they are and don't want changes.

Facilities for children

Improvements suggested but need evidence that the lack of facilities for children is deterring customers. Need to balance provision for children with needs of other customers and our neighbours.

Clear support for the tenants to communicate through email, website and social media about events and menus.
